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BRIERLEY HILL WAR MEMORIAL

The Brierley Hill War Memorial was officially unveiled on 12th November 1921 by a party of local clergy and civic dignitaries. The initial design for the monument was by Councillor Fereday and this was elaborated by Francis Lane, a preacher and local businessman. It was carved by George Brown & Sons of Kidderminster.

The ex-servicemen's committee was asked to select one of their number to pose for the statue. They chose Stanley Harley, the first Brierley Hill man to be awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal (DCM).

In 2015 the monument was listed Grade II. In 2021, in its centenary year, the memorial and its associated gardens were repaired thanks to funding through the Brierley Hill High Street Heritage Action Zone.

THE EARLY YEARS - BEFORE 1921

1919 – A call to action

Anyone walking along Brierley Hill High Street on the evening of Saturday 18th January 1919 would have witnessed a stream of ex-servicemen, many wearing their silver stars and wound stripes, entering The Three Crowns public house. A meeting had been called by Dudley Federation of Ex-Servicemen to urge Brierley Hill to organise and to demand action to recognise the service of their fallen comrades in the Great War. The meeting was the start of a chain of events which was to establish the town's war memorial.

The Advertiser, a Liberal local newspaper, reported on the meeting and its call to action (25th January 1919):

Several speakers emphasised the way in which Brierley Hill was said to be "off the map" with regard to its rewarding returned heroes, and a strong plea was put in that at the next local election the discharged men should seek to get representation on the local Council.

A great many would be unable to return to factory or other works, because of their ailments. Already there had been shown evidence that employers were not disposed to treat the men generously, or to carry out the promises that were so lavishly made when the men were urged to go and fight the country's battles.

There was an urgency to act.

...the heart of the nation would grow cold...and though there would no longer be the work-house or the gutter for the disabled man, as there had been, there would not be the enthusiasm (to do something) there was at present.

The meeting was urged to consider what type of memorial would be of most value and the future welfare of the ex-

servicemen was crucial

...any talked-of war memorial should take the form of a place where the men who had been in the Army could assemble, where the men who had fought and suffered could meet and talk over old times and encourage one another in the various walks of civil life they had again taken up. Statues and town halls were good in their way, but the men would derive no benefit from statues, and as far as town halls were concerned, no doubt as there was good and bad in everything...

Alas, the town's approach to returning men was attacked:

... Brierley Hill thus far has done nothing in rewarding publicly the men who by their gallant deeds had won honours and thus brought honour to the town. He also referred to the fact that apparently no public man in Brierley Hill took sufficient interest in the discharged soldier, even to be present at that meeting.

He considered it a rotten disgrace to the town that though there were several of its men who had won distinction not one had been worthily honoured publicly, the only recognition that had been made being that of one soldier who received a silver watch, the personal present of the chairman of the Council...

... It was a disgrace to Brierley Hill, and he strongly advised the discharged soldiers to combine, and to make their organisation strong enough so that at the local election next April they could run their own candidate for the Council and get him in to look after their interests as well as the local interests of the town.

As a result, the meeting agreed to form a Federation. In its editorial that week the Advertiser argued:

... there can be no question that, locally, there is a good deal of soreness over the fact that the returned heroes have not been publicly welcomed and honoured. There are several men who have returned proudly wearing distinctions won by gallant deeds. There can be no doubt as to who they are. Our columns have, time after time, mentioned the respective honours conferred. And yet, while we can read of such men being feted and honoured and their gallantry publicly recognised in other places, Brierley Hill has only one such occasion to its credit, and then the presentation made was a private gift, and not a publicly subscribed for acknowledgment. This ought not to be.

The council response

The council, under pressure, was quick to respond. Defensively it pointed out that action had already been taken. They had already announced dinners for returning prisoners of war. Over 62 widows and bereaved mothers had received Christmas gifts from the Soldiers' and Sailors' Association - 7/6 each and an additional 1/- for each child "of which there were 92". Councillor J. T. Fereday - a distinguished glass engraver - had designed an "In Memoriam" emblem to be sent to each family of those who had lost their lives, reading:

On behalf of the inhabitants of Brierley Hill we ask you to accept this memorial in token of our heartfelt sympathy in your bereavement, and also as an expression of our grateful recognition of the great sacrifice he made, and of our admiration of the patriotism he displayed in giving his life in the great warfare for the security of our Homeland and the triumph of Liberty and Right in the world.

The certificate was signed by A. Ernest Marsh, the chairman of the council (Marsh was also the Chairman of Marsh & Baxter's.)

Moving forward, at a meeting of the Brierley Hill Patriotic Committee on Wednesday 29th January in the Council Chamber, its chairman, A. Ernest Marsh...

... announced that it was intended, at the first convenient opportunity at Brierley Hill, to entertain to a public dinner the whole of the local returned prisoners of war, and also all the Brierley Hill men who had received honours in the war. It had also been decided that on the occasion of the dinner the prisoners of war should receive a present, and that presentations should be made to the men who had received distinctions.

And a full council meeting on 3rd February Mr. J. Chattin (of Chattin and Horton) asked:

...what was being done with regard to a war memorial for Brierley Hill. The town seemed to be a bit behind most of the neighbouring authorities. They could not pick up a paper without finding a report of some district taking the matter up. The Brierley Hill people had looked after the relatives while the war was on, and proposed to entertain the men when they returned, but he thought they ought to go further and do something in the way of a permanent memorial to the men. They had made great sacrifices for us, and we were bound in honour to do something in the way of a permanent memorial to record our thanks to them in the way of a public building or something.

Several suggestions had been made as to what a memorial would look like, from an extension to the Corbett hospital to extending the Technical Institute in which they were meeting. It was decided to put the matter to a public meeting to discuss the whole issue.

The Advertiser (9th February) kept on the pressure to act. In an editorial it commented.

Councillor Chattin is to be commended for being the first to voice in public the undoubted dissatisfaction of the town with the dilatoriness of the local Council in doing something in the way of a war memorial. It is all very well for members to pooh-pooh the criticism offered. It is widespread, and the Council must know that the discharged men, the townspeople generally, in fact, most people, are some-what indignant at the scurvy way in which the men themselves have been treated

The town meeting – three proposals

Over 70 people attended the town meeting the following Monday, 10th February. There was no shortage of ideas put forward. An extension to Corbett Hospital; extending the technical school; a clock for the town. Despite these admirable suggestions, three proposals emerged around which there was agreement.

Firstly, Mr. Broome spoke from the Labour Party perspective. It felt that a recreation ground or park for the town would be a "splendid thing" for future generations. D. Guttery supported the idea - men had been fighting not only for liberty and freedom:

... but for purity and sweeter living. That could only come about by providing sweeter environment and recreation, and a sense of beauty. A park would be a means of giving a beauty spot to the town. Why not make the town beautiful and worthy of living in. Then they would keep the ambitious young men at home, whose ideas of what a beautiful surroundings should be, ought to be harmonised by the surroundings provided for them

A memorial should be provided in the park.

Secondly, Sergeant W. H. Green advocated the view which had been put forward at the meeting of ex-servicemen. Some form of club for the men would be a wonderful thing. Perhaps this could be in a recreation ground, but it shouldn't be of a religious or political nature - the possibility of a church army hut had been floated but rejected.

Whilst the first two options seem to have dominated most of the discussion, some kind of monument to the fallen men (again perhaps in the park) was also advocated. Discussion of this option was less reported in the media reports of the meeting - there seemed to be a unanimity of view on the matter, which may account for this.

The meeting concluded by setting up a committee to take forward the options. Members of the committee were:

Chairman, Councillor A. E. Marsh; vice-chairman, Councillor James; Committee - Councillor Broome, the Rector (Rev. H. W. Jones), Mr. Alfred Cawse, ex-Sgt. Green, Councillors Fereday, Williams, Gordon, Chattin, Messrs. Guttery, E. C. Williams, Wallace Green, Pugh, Downward, and Dudley. Mr. E. W. Waldron was elected hon. secretary, and Mr. E. C. Williams treasurer.

Something like Dudley's South African war memorial

The committee met for the first time the following Friday (19th Feb 1919), with the object of discussing the proposals arising out of the town meeting. It re-emphasised that the memorial should be a public park, within which would be a monument, and, in addition a club should be provided for the returning service men.

The general consensus of opinion seemed to be in favour of the erection of some piece of statuary following the lines of the memorial in Dudley Cemetery to the heroes of the South African War. (19 Feb 1919 - Advertiser)

Mr. J. T. Fereday was chosen to chair a small sub-committee to consider the matter further, along with Mr. Frank Lane the honorary secretary.

Meanwhile, discussions in the town continued about the most suitable location for the monument. Although great efforts had been made to secure a park for the town, these had been unsuccessful. It was concerning that a delay in finding suitable ground for a park would slow down the creation of a memorial. A site had to be found, independently of the park. The centre of Five Ways was one suggestion. But the committee had a better idea.

A monument on Church Hill

By the end of March, Fereday and Lane came back with their recommendation. The best location would be on the most prominent place in the town - Church Hill Promenade, erected c.1883-84 as a local Board Improvement by Josiah Beckley.

There can hardly be two opinions as to the suitability of the proposed site, for a monument placed there would be a conspicuous landmark for miles (29th March 1919 - Advertiser)

The County Express (29th March 1919) gave a detailed description of the proposed monument:

The pedestal will be of two broad steps, above which will be the plinth, and over this the square shaft or column. This will be surmounted by four panels supported in the corners on Corinthian pillars. In the panels, in relief, it is suggested there be carved scenes illustrating four phases of the war:



(1) *infantry leaving the trenches* (this was intended to show men going over the top from the trenches into no-man's land)





(2) field artillery in action



(3) the navy and air service



(4) *the Royal Army Medical Corp (R.A.M.C) attending the wounded*

The whole will be surmounted by the figure of a soldier fully equipped for the attack.

Beneath the panels there will be inscribed, to show what our soldiers, sailors and airmen fought for, the words, "For Homeland," "For Freedom," "For Kindred," "For Righteousness;" and on the plinth, indicating the four main theatres of the war, "Flanders," "France," "Galipoli," and "Mesopotamia."

One of the four sides of the column or shaft will bear the following inscription:

"In gratitude and admiration this monument was erected by their fellow townsfolk to the memory of Brierley Hill men who loyally gave their lives in defence of country and civilisation against the aggressive ambitions of Germay, Austria, Turkey, and Bulgaria in the great war which lasted from August 4th, 1914 to November 11th, 1918. 'Their name liveth for evermorel'"

The names of the fallen heroes will be inscribed on the other three sides.

There is also a proposal in the minds of the committee for making a terrace leading from the main road in Church Street by easy stages of steps to the level of the monument. This would prove a very desirable alteration. It would give the "Hill" a much bolder appearance, and at the same time provide an easy means of reaching the promenade from the roadway.

The following week a sketch of the monument was printed in the paper.



Who were Fereday and Lane?

Cllr John Thomas Fereday was employed for 40 years as a glass designer and decorator by Thomas Webb & Sons, at the Dennis glassworks. He was one of four skilled engravers. He retired in 1922.

Francis Lane lived in Bell Street Brierley Hill. He had worked as a wheelwright and then pattern maker where he developed skills in technical drawing and design. By 1911, Lane had moved into management and was the manager of a firebrick works. He was elected to Brierley Hill Council in 1913 and in 1916 he became the lay reader in the Anglican Church. He was a churchwarden at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Delph.

Similarities to the South African war memorial

Anyone travelling from Brierley Hill to Dudley by tram in 1919 could not fail to see the South African monument in Dudley Cemetery. It was designed by Mr. H. O. Burgess and unveiled by Sir N. G. Lyttleton on 23rd September 1904.

Comparisons with the Brierley Hill monument are striking. The 1904 memorial comprised a plinth, surmounted by the figure of a soldier and a list of the key battlegrounds of the South African War. Two differences are the Brierley Hill memorial has four carved scenes of four phases of the war, and, whereas the soldiers in Dudley are listed by how they died (in action or of wounds) and then by rank and surname, the Brierley Hill names are listed alphabetically by surname and initial, reflecting that each soldier had made an equal sacrifice.

Marsh Park and the British Legion

As well as the memorial, two other objectives were set in response to the town meeting: a park for the town, and a place for returned soldiers to meet.

Marsh Park was donated later in 1919 to the town by Marsh & Baxter. As a former pit mound it took considerable effort to make it fit for its new purpose. It was opened to the public in September 1921.

The Club for the men took longer to achieve. Finally, premises in Albion Street were secured in 1925 for the new British Legion.

Raising funds for the memorial in hard times

Following the Great War, the economy went into a severe depression. The working population suffered from high levels of unemployment and reductions in wages. For example:

- Unemployed ex-servicemen were recruited 50-60 at a time to lay out the new park, working two weeks on, and two weeks off to maximise the benefit of the work.
- Industrial unrest in the face of wage cuts for example, the 1920 miners' strike, added to the economic hardship of the town, with industry reliant on coal to fire its furnaces. Even when this was over, unemployment continued to rise. By March 1921, the jobless total reached 2,470. A distress fund was set up to support the families. Having raised and distributed some £759, the distribution of help had to be suspended.
- This is a pity as the number of unemployed is increasing daily and the plight of the women and children is getting worse County Express 25 Jun 1921
- Residents of the High Ercal Estate, the first of the Council's post-war housing schemes (just down the road from the memorial) declared a rent strike. One resident explained that his wage had fallen from 15s 2d a day to just 6s 2d, a drop of over half. The rents were simply unaffordable.

In this context it is hardly surprising that, despite public fund-raising efforts - whist drives and dances for example - the largest donations for the newly established memorial funds came from local industries.

On the 4th October 1919 The Advertiser published a list of subscribers to the fund:


Marsh & Baxter had already donated Marsh Park to the town, the site being "...worth at the lowest estimate over £1,500."

Further significant donations were reported in the press, including £200 each from the two Misses Harris of the Elms, £200 from Samuel Newton, £100 from Mr. D. W. Cooper, £26.5s from the Stourbridge Glazed Brick Company, and £26 5s from Messrs Harris & Pearson.

Nevertheless, even with these donations, it became clear that the whole scheme would be unaffordable.

Removing the planned base

The plans had included a base and set of steps leading from Church Street up to the memorial. A fundraising postcard had been produced which depicted this vision:

In June 1920, the War Memorial Committee had received a quotation of between £1,500 and £1,600 for the alteration to the base. The monument itself was only to cost £1,000. It was suggested that the cost be met by the council, using the rather spurious argument that the base was part of the hill rather than the memorial, thereby getting around local government regulation. Given the economic circumstances of the town this, however, was not to be.

The final design

A more cost-effective solution was put forward which resulted in the omission of the grand set of staircases. The materials used for the final monument consisted of limestone for the platform, grey granite for the plinth and Sicilian marble used for the columns to the corners, the relief panels and the statue.

In plan, a tall, square plinth supporting a figure statue and railings to the edge of the monument rising from a raised curb. Each face of the plinth divided into two stages, both of which with columns to the corners. The stages divided by a lintel, set above with a carved relief panel, showing service activity, and below which the carved names of the 205 fallen from the First World War.

On the north face the following inscription:

IN GRATITUDE & ADMIRATION THIS MEMORIAL WAS ERECTED

BY THEIR FELLOW TOWN FOLK TO THE MEMORY OF BRIERLEY HILL MEN WHO LOYALLY GAVE THEIR LIVES IN DEFENCE OF COUNTRY AND CIVILISATION AGAINST THE AGGRESSIVE AMBITIONS OF GERMANY AUSTRIA & TURKEY IN THE GREAT WAR WHICH LASTED FROM AUGUST 4TH 1914 TO NOVEMBER 11TH 1918. THEIR NAME LIVETH FOR EVERMORE

Above this, a relief panel showing men going over the top from trenches into no-man's land. On the lintel is inscribed 'FOR RIGHTEOUSNESS' and to the plinth is the word 'FLANDERS'.

The west side a relief panel, showing the Arethusa, which having sunk a German warship, is sending out its boats to rescue the survivors. On the lintel, below this is inscribed 'FOR HOMELAND' and on the plinth 'GALLIPOLI'.

The relief on the east side shows artillery in action and the lintel is inscribed 'FOR KINDRED', and the plinth 'PALESTINE'.

The south side shows a wounded man on a stretcher being tended and the words 'FOR FREEDOM' on the lintel and 'FRANCE' on the plinth.

The statue of the soldier above shows him in uniform, charging with bayonet fixed. The top step of the limestone plinth has a cambered upper surface and groups of three flutings to its riser on each side.

The kerb has three cast iron mace finials to each side, which now support later panels of wrought iron (but perhaps originally had decorative chains). It is inscribed on its south face with the wording 'G BROWN & SONS / SCULPTORS / KIDDR. & ST.BRIDGE.'

Stanley Harley: The soldier on top of the memorial

On the 4th March 1917, Lance-Corporal F. H. S. Harley of the Worcestershire Regiment, took part in an action at Bouichavesnes, France, which resulted in him being awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

The Worcestershire platoons opened a hot fire. Lance-Corporal F. H. S. Harley, in particular, did notable execution with his Lewis-gun, and the remnant of the attacking enemy were driven to cover. L/Cpl. Harley was awarded the D.C.M.





For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He opened fire with his machine gun at a critical time and defeated all enemy attempts to counter attack. Later, he carried two machine guns out of action through a heavy hostile barrage. (11th May 1917 - The London Gazette)

Over 200 men, including 10 officers were killed in the action.

Lance-Corporal Harley was the first Brierley Hill man to be awarded such a distinguished medal. Harley, son of Mrs Murray and stepson of Mr. Murray of Hill Street Brierley Hill and an employee of the Earl of Dudley's Round Oak Works had enlisted on 2nd September, 1914, when only 16 years of age, and was just 18 when the events took place for which he was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal (County Express 19th May 1917)

When he returned home on leave in September, he was invited to the Council meeting to be congratulated on his honour. Cllr. Marsh expressed the pride the town felt towards him and presented him with a silver watch in recognition of his bravery.

Following the war, Harley, by then the chairman of the Federation of Ex-Servicemen, was chosen to pose for a series of photographs to be used by Messrs. George Brown and Sons in the making of the figure on top of the memorial.

The Sicilian marble, life-sized figure, fully equipped and in an "on guard' attitude arrived at the war memorial on 30th June 1921. In later life, Harley became an active trade unionist, and a councillor for Brockmoor from 1935 to 1938. In 1940, he was amongst the first of the Round Oak group to join the Local Defence Volunteers, later renamed the Home Guard. The group was responsible for the security of the works. He died on 1st March 1968 (Stan Hill's Brierley Hill and Life).

Just below the memorial is a canon. This is a souvenir of the Siege of Mafeking, October 1899-May 1900. In a search for arms, General Baden-Powell's (he of Scouts' fame) retrieved an old naval canon which was serving as a gatepost in a nearby field. It was nicknamed "The Lord Nelson" or "Skipping Sally" and was moved from one position to another to give the illusion that the British Forces had more fire-power than was the actual fact. The initials "BP" were on the canon. This referred to its manufacturers, Bailey Pegg of Silver End, Brierley Hill. In their works, Bailey Pegg found a sister canon of the same design and presented it to the town in July 1900. A platform on Church Hill was constructed, and the gun was put in place on 19th March 1901.

"When the gun arrived on the hill, it was seen that it had been mounted by the firm on a strong wooden ship carriage - it is a ship gun - and was completely fitted. A few minutes work sufficed to get it into position, with its nozzle pointing towards Clent. On each side of the gun is a specially cast brass plate, bearing in raised letters the following explanation :-

"Old Government pattern cast iron gun, manufactured at Brierley Works, Brierley Hill, similar to the old gun "Skipping Sally", as used by General Baden-Powell in the defence of Mafeking, South African War, 1900. Presented to the town of Brierley Hill by the makers, Messrs. Bailey, Pegg, and Co., July, 1900." (Advertiser 23rd March 1901)

The unveiling ceremony, 12th November 1921

The memorial was officially unveiled by Viscount Ednam, son of the Earl of Dudley, on Saturday 12th November 1921.

A procession marched from the Technical Institute and library.

'.....the band of the 3rd North Midland Field Company of the Royal Engineers, followed by members of the company, discharged soldiers and sailors (four abreast), local clergy and ministers and members of the Council and War Memorial Committee and their wives'.

Ten mounted police officers rode in front of the parade. Relatives of the fallen assembled in the Rectory Grounds and then took up position in front of the returned soldiers at the memorial. Ex servicemen stood along the path in front of the church.

The ceremony commenced with the singing of the hymn "Oh God our help in ages past". After prayers, the huge flag covering the memorial was removed. The troops presented arms, and several bugles sounded "The Last Post."



Viscount Ednam addressed the crowd:

"We have before us, all of us, a great duty. It is this. We must see that those heroes, who so unflinchingly gave their lives rather than that the honour and glory of the British Empire should perish, should have an everlasting home in our memory. We must never forget them; we must never cease to profit by their wonderful example of self-sacrifice and unselfishness. We must profit by it ourselves - we must point it out to our children that they may profit by it also."

There followed the wreath laying ceremony, and the party retired to a function at the Technical Institute.

Delph Memorial

Carved into the Brierley Hill War Memorial were the 205 names of the fallen from the First World War, 20 of which are also listed on the Delph War Memorial.

The Delph in 1921 was a thriving community in its own right with a mission church, *The Church of the Good Shepherd*, established in 1886

In June 1919, a meeting of the congregation was held to consider the question of the provision of a war memorial. It was decided to provide as a memorial to the fallen, a font, with a tablet displaying the names of the fallen, and a *Roll of Honour* containing the names of all Delph men who served in the war.

Funds were raised through the congregation, the Sunday School and local inhabitants resulting in a brass tablet, emblazoned with the words "THIS FONT AND TABLET IS DEDICATED TO OUR GLORIOUS DEAD WHO FELL IN ACTION IN THE GREAT WAR", dedicated by the Bishop of Lichfield on Monday 17th January 1921.

Unfortunately, in 1952 the church had to close due to subsidence. The tablet, font and Roll of Honour were therefore transferred to St Michael's in Brierley Hill. The Roll of Honour can be viewed inside the church, as can the memorial tablet. The font stands outside at the foot of the church tower.



Of the 28 names on the Delph Memorial, 20 are also inscribed on the Brierley Hill War memorial, leaving eight names that only appear on the Delph War Memorial tablet and only viewable by gaining access inside the Church. As part of the 2021 centenary, the names of the other eight were added to a separate, angled tablet which was sympathetically placed next to the other, later tablets laid to commemorate the dead from the Second World War, the Korean War and the Cyprus and Malayan Emergencies. Thus therefore ensures that the fallen from the Delph are also part of a more publicly accessible monument and on full display at all times.

The names of the fallen

Listed on the main memorial are 205 names, with an additional 8 names listed on the separate Delph Memorial tablet, thereby representing a total of 213 lives sacrificed in the Great War. From the alphabetical ordering of names, it can be seen that several were added after the 1921 unveiling. A call out was made to families and relatives to come forward with names, and it is these which are recorded on the memorial. As stated above, the names are given as surname and initial. This presents a challenge for anyone researching the monument, but in recent times the arrival of the internet and the British Newspaper Archive, together with more traditional sources, such as local newspapers and the Staffordshire Roll of Honour, make it possible to piece together something of the history of the individuals. The search is always for a Brierley Hill link in the various databases. Every endeavour has been made through the various sources to ensure that all details are accurate, but if you know better than please let us know.

The Ages

Half of those listed on the memorial were just 24 years old or younger when they lost their lives. Sixty-nine were just 21 or younger, including two below the age of 18.

The Emotional Impact - Family by Family

The emotional impact of war is huge. The death of any soldier must have brought terrible grief and the death of more than one family member has an unimaginable impact. Family by family the war had a devastating impact, for example, John and Arthur Allden (uncle and nephew); and brothers Joseph and Benjamin Hartland of Cottage Street, two 21 year olds, Ernest and George Grazier; James and Ernest Page of Parkes Street; George, Dudley and Harry Pearson - *"Few families in the land have made so terrible sacrifice in the war as Mr and Mrs Dudley Pearson, of No. 4, Coffee House Row, off High Street, Brierley Hill. This week the distressed parents have officially learned that another of their sons, making three in all, has paid the supreme sacrifice. In their crushing bereavement Mr and Mrs Dudley Pearson will receive the heartfelt sympathy of every resident of the town and district. Mr Pearson is an employee of the District Council, being a horse driver, a position he has held for a considerable number of years." -;*

Joseph and William Rea of Bull Street; George and Joseph Simpson, Hill Street and Fred and Arthur Worton - both of whom are buried in St Michael's Churchyard -

Aubrey and Joe Maiden...in his final letter home (dated 13th October 1916), the day before he died, Joe expressed his hopes that his brothers, Aubrey and Fred would be able to escape the horrors of the war "... can't say that I am sorry Fred is not getting better, because the sooner he is marked active the sooner he will be out here again. I guess he had had enough to last him a bit. I've had enough, but I still have to carry on. Such is war. Aubrey ought to stand a good chance of getting back, as he is under age, but I think he would have stood a better chance as a Private. I have not got any special news. I can't say that I have had a good birthday, as we are in the trenches". Sadly, it was not to be, Aubrey was one of the four soldiers who died during the Spring Offensive on 21st March 1918.

Street by Street

And if the terrible toll of the war was felt family by family, so too was it felt street by street. As you gaze from the War Memorial towards the flats, some 15 soldiers from the homes which formerly occupied their place were killed. Beyond that, 16 from the Delph. To your right 4 soldiers from Church Street. To you left 7 from Bell Street and 10 from the High Street. From behind us on Seagers Lane and Moor Street, some 11 soldiers are commemorated.

The scale and impact of the war on families and the town was immense.

No known grave

Of the 213 Great War men on memorials, 83 (39% - two in every five) are commemorated on memorials and have no known grave. The memorials read like a grim map of the conflict: Thiepval (Somme) - 14 names; Helles (Gallipoli) - 6 names; Arras - 14 names; Tyne Cot (Ypres) - 14 names; and Menin Gate (Ypres) - 8 names.

It was common on battlefields to crawl out under fire to comrades who had been killed, and to recover pay books, wallets, and information which could identify who it was that had fallen. Often these would be sent home to relatives as a confirmation of death, at least sparing the false and cruel hope that a "missing in action" soldier could be alive. The downside of this compassionate practice was that when burial parties were able to do their work, it was impossible to identify who each fallen soldier was.


The regiments

Almost three out of every five men belonged to either the South Staffordshire (76 or 35.8%) Regiment or the Worcestershire Regiment (46 or 27.7%). 'E' Company of the South Staffordshire 1/5 Territorial Battalion was based in Brierley Hill.

These are followed by Royal Engineers, seven (3.3%); the Royal Horse and Royal Field Artillery, five (2.4%); and the Gloucestershire, Machine Gun Corps, Royal Garrison Artillery, Sherwood Forrester's Regiments, each of four (1.9% each).

A seismograph of events on the Continent

Plotting the number of deaths by day reveals a seismograph reflecting the terrible events on the continent.



The worst day for Brierley Hill was 13th October 1917. No fewer than six deaths occurred on that single day alone, when members of the 1/5 South Staffordshire Regiment went over the top in an effort to seize the Hohenzollern Redoubt. The local press described it as a "day of darkness" for Brierley Hill and Quarry Bank. The six men are commemorated on the Loos memorial.

"We were ordered to charge at five minutes past two ... Our objective was to retake the Redoubt... We know it was going to be a big task and that many would go under, but we went into it with all our hearts and did our best... You can imagine what it was like, with a murderous machine-gun fire against us. I had got almost 200 yards when a bullet from a machine gun hit me in the left hand... I had to lie flat on the ground scarcely daring the breathe. There I stayed for an hour or so until the fire slackened and then I crawled back to our lines, the bullets pinging around me the while." - Pte B. Davis, 1/5 South Staffords. A second peak of the grim seismograph reveals that on 21st March 1918, during the German Spring Offensive - their final big push to penetrate the allied lines, five Brierley Hill men were killed that day. They have no known graves and are commemorated on the Arras Memorial.

Third in the grim league table of deaths was on 4th October 1917 during the Third Battle of Ypres. Four Brierley Hill men lost their lives that day and are commemorated on the Tyne Cot Memorial.

The Second World War tablets

Financial challenges regarding the provision of war memorials remained. At the end of this war the council still did not have any statutory powers to provide financing for such projects so any memorial would have to be financed by voluntary donations.

The council decided that an appropriate and affordable memorial would be a Book of Remembrance, at an estimated cost of £200-£250. In 1947, Herbert Hex, Clerk to the council wrote to the relatives of the fallen outlining the project:

The Council are desirous that the names of its citizens who have fallen in the service of their Country, shall be perpetuated in some simple manner, in a location accessible to all.

In view however of the fact that on many memorials of the last war, names can be read only with difficulty, the Council have decided that a Book of Remembrance would provide a very beautiful and durable record, which would when completed, be kept in the Council Chamber, until such time as a more suitable and permanent place is found.

The letter enclosed a form requesting details of the fallen from relatives. The subsequent Book of Remembrance is available to view in Dudley Archives. It gives the names, addresses, service details and date and location of death of almost all of those on the memorial.

The 1948 Local Government Act, at last, empowered councils, subject to the approval of the minister, to expend funds on providing memorials.

In May 1949, the British Legion wrote to the council asking for financial support to provide for the restoration of the original names on the war memorial, together with funding for new tablets to be provided to commemorate those lost in the Second World War. A small War Memorial Committee was formed, and it gained quotes for the proposed work, to be provided to the ministry. On 23rd January 1950, the Committee sent the estimates and specification to the council:

BRIERLEY HILL. That the existing memorial on Church Hill should be cleared, and all lettering re-gilded. Furthermore, that scrolls containing the names of the heroes of the last war should surround the base. The estimated cost is £160 0s. 0d...

... We feel sure this worthy object will warmly commend itself to you, and that you will be pleased to give it financial assistance.

The work was approved, and on 22nd March 1950 the Clerk to the Council was writing to Messrs. R. L. Jones and Sons, Monumental Masons of Wellington Road Dudley urging the work to start as soon as possible *"…and the existing lettering on the memorial and the lettering of the names to be added should be done in gold leaf and not painted."*

The unveiling

By September 1950, notices were sent out to announce the unveiling which was to take place on Sunday 8th October 1950. Local personalities, organisations and, most importantly, relatives of the fallen were invited, the latter with a promise of a reserved place and an invitation to place floral tributes at the foot of the tower if they so wished.

The arrangements for the day were that the parade (including representatives of the forces, the British Legion, Scouts and Guides, St John Ambulance, members and officers of the council and townspeople) was to assemble at the British Legion in Albion Street, then processing to Brockmoor Church at 2.30 pm. The unveiling of the Lychgate Memorial was to take place at 2.45 pm before the procession moved to pass the town hall for a salute at 3.45 pm and arriving at the Church Hill Memorial for its unveiling at 4:15pm.

Unveiling the new tablet, Mr. Simmons said that the names of those who gave their lives in order that we might live, which were engraved on that perishable stone were also imperishably engraved in the hearts of those they loved, and in the book of life.

"We should erect to them," he continued, "by deed and action, imperishable memorial by working, and striving for the establishment of those ideals and principles for which they laid down their lives."

At the conclusion of the ceremony, the party retired to the Albion Street headquarters of the British Legion for refreshments and speeches.

The Second World War Statistics

Listed on the tablets at the base of the memorial are 90 names. There are however striking differences with the Great War memorial.

Firstly, having learnt from the traumas of the Great War when many soldiers from the same town were killed on the same day, there were only two days when more than one Brierley Hill man were lost:

- 1st October 1942, when E.G. Beardsmore (R.A.F.) died in a Japanese prisoner of war camp, and O. Hickman was lost at sea off the Japan war area; and
- D-Day on 6th June 1944 when F.T. Burns (Green Berets) was lost in Normandy, and D. Johnson (R.A.F.) was killed at the Cherbourg Peninsula, northern France.

This difference resulted from a change in the military recruiting policy. No longer were there locally-based recruitment drives into certain regiments. Whereas the South Staffordshire and Worcestershire Regiments had dominated Brierley Hill recruits, the memorial lists were just two and six for those regiments respectively.

The greatest loss of life by service was suffered by the RAF, with 16 airstaff, followed by the Royal Artillery with 14 personnel.

Age of casualties in the Second World War

The average age of the casualties is again just 24 years of age, but there are none below the age of 19. Perhaps there had been a tightening of underaged recruits too.

Family tragedies

The Andrews family of No. 2 Wallows Road lost three sons, Sidney at sea, George Henry in Tunisia and, tragically, Thomas who died because of an accident whilst enlisted in the Royal Navy. Thomas is buried in St Michael's churchyard.

Thomas and William Hancock of No.31 Hawbush Road also lost their lives. Firstly, William in the Mediterranean on 27th November 1941, and then, just a month before VE day, Thomas in Germany.

Street by Street

The key streets most affected were Wallows Road (eight), Moor Street and Hawbush Road (six each), Addison Road (five) and Fens Crescent (four). In this respect, the Second World War tablets cover a wider area and includes Brockmoor. All 27 names on the Brockmoor Lychgate memorial are also inscribed on the Church Hill Memorial.

Three other sacrifices

Three further names were added to the war memorial from conflicts since the Second World War.

Korean War 1950-1953

Ronald George Davies was a member of the 41 Independent Commando Battalion of the Royal Marines. He went missing during Royal Marine operations on 29th November 1950. It wasn't until prisoners of war were released after the war that his death was confirmed and his name was added to the memorial. Sadly, he has no known grave.

Malayan Emergency 1948-1960

R. E. Dunn, aged just 19, is recorded as being a member of the 11th Battalion of the Worcestershire Regiment. He died on 23rd July 1951 and is recorded as "Died by accident or natural causes". He is buried in the Kamunting Road Christian Cemetery, Taiping, Pera, Malaysia.

The Cyprus Emergency 1955-1960

Private Joseph Anthony Hawker was serving with the 3rd Battalion of the Parachute Regiment Army Air Corps aged 19 when he was "killed when a forest fire swept across their position near Prevassa in the Troodos Mountains during operation 'Lucky Alphonse' on 17th June 1956. He is buried in Wayne's Keep Military Cemetery, Nicosia.

Grade II listing in 2015

In the lead up to the centenary of the First World War, Historic England undertook a national review of all places and structures associated with the First World War, resulting in the Brierley Hill War Memorial being listed Grade II on the 27th January 2015. The principal reasons for its listing were as follows:

- Historic interest: as an eloquent witness to the tragic impacts of world wars on this community, and the sacrifices it made in the various conflicts of the 20th century;
- Artistic interest: as the work of a notable local firm, which includes sculpture and relief panels of good quality;
- Sculptural value: of significant value as an artistic representation designed by local people and depicting a local hero portrayed as the charging soldier.

The Centenary - 2021

In 2021, thanks to funding through the Brierley Hill High Street Heritage Action Zone, substantial repairs were undertaken to the War Memorial and its associated memorial gardens by Dudley Council.

The work was divided up into two phases, overseen by Oliver Architecture and undertaken by Midland Conservation.

Phase 1 commenced on-site in August 2021 and focused on installing lighting, undertaking repairs to the War Memorial and immediate setting, and having AH scanning do a 3D laser scan of the marble statue and four relief panels. This was completed in time for its centenary, where it was draped in a cascade of knitted poppies, hand created by an army of local community volunteers.



Phase 2 commenced late November 2021, and focused on the War Memorial Gardens, where significant stabilisation works to the embankment had to be undertaken, along with structural repairs to the intermediate walls that run through its centre, redecorating and repairing the railings, plus the laying out of a soft landscaping. New natural stone paving was also provided to the terrace (replacing the existing cracked concrete slabs). This Phase was very appropriately completed in time for the Queen's Baton relay (July 2022), which made a stop at Brierley Hill War Memorial and was being run in order to 'ignite hope, solidarity and collaboration' during what was the Platinum Jubilee year for Queen Elizabeth II and this time it was draped in in a cascade of knitted flowers as part of Brierley Hill in Bloom.

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
